We currently have 94 active volunteers and since becoming Vet to Vet Maine we have served 156 veteran friends, and our volunteers have logged over 15,000 hours! We have enriched the lives of the veterans that we serve and have helped them obtain the benefits that they have earned, and also have provided respite and support for family members caring for veterans.

REUNIONS & HOPE

Ever Hopeful

Vet to Vet Maine's third year as an independent nonprofit began as the previous year had ended, with a mix of fear for the safety of our vulnerable veterans (and ourselves) as the COVID-19 pandemic continued to rage over the globe and hope that a vaccine might soon be developed that would open doors to in-person meetings again.

That hope was realized early in 2021 as the longed-for vaccine became available. By spring, with many of our volunteers and veteran friends vaccinated and with infection rates declining, we deemed it safe enough to allow in-person visits between vaccinated peer companions and their vaccinated veteran friends. The reunions that followed reinspired us all.

The long time apart and the enthusiastic reunions made clear how deeply the companions value each other's company. Tom, 94, and his peer companion Jerry were finally able to ride their bikes to Fort Williams again, joking with each other over who was the most fit.

Throughout the pandemic, Eric and Vernon talked on the phone and Eric delivered many books to his friend, who lives at a nursing home. A longed-awaited reunion took place at the home 13 months after their separation. "There's a firmer foundation for the two of us when we're together," Eric said. "It's really good that [our reunion] happened."

It was a big day for Dave and his friend, Leo, when they visited in person after being apart for 13 months. "We had a wonderful time together," Dave reported.

Charlene, whose veteran friend Vi turned 98 during the pandemic, finally arranged an in-person

visit at the Maine Veterans' Home in Scarborough, where Vi resided. "She loved it!" Charlene said. "Vi and I got to sit next to each other and hold hands." They both laughed a lot during that visit. Vi told Charlene she hadn't laughed in a long time. Sadly, Vi died on April 15, not long after Charlene's second visit. Vi and Charlene had been V2VME friends since 2016.

We continue to be cautious about COVID, especially among our vulnerable veterans, and follow CDC guidelines. But the hope remains.

V2VME's volunteers offer veterans assistance and friendships that can last a lifetime. Now veterans' caregivers can benefit, too



CARE FOR CAREGIVERS

Thanks to the efforts of V2VME volunteer Kathy Lavigne, those who provide care for veterans in the Vet to Vet Maine program have their own support system. Called the Caregivers Support Network, the new V2VME program welcomes veterans' caregivers to participate in quarterly meetings (held on the second Thursday in January, April, July, and October via Zoom). The meetings feature speakers on topics of mutual interest and provide time for caregivers to share their own stories among themselves. The program is funded by V2VME's Women's Special Project Fund, established by Maine Health Access Foundation in honor of V2VME board member Shirl Weaver.

Participants, who are referred to the program by V2VME staff and peer companions, are encouraged to communicate directly with others in the Caregivers Support Network. In addition, when the veteran being cared for dies, the caregiver is invited to join other survivors for informal lunches and gatherings (when safety allows). As Kathy noted recently, "We want our caregivers to know there are those who care very much. We are one military family!"

to hire Judie O'Malley, an experienced volunteer coordinator who worked with Vet to Vet at Southern Maine Agency on Aging, as part-time program director and volunteer coordinator. Her first day was July 9, 2020, and since that time she's proved her worth many times over.

- We continue to expand our service base in Central and Eastern Maine, adding volunteers and veteran friends in those areas. That has been made possible by the advent of Zoom as a means of training volunteers who lived too far away to attend in person before COVID.
- As part of our strategic plan to expand to the entire state and to serve as a national model in the future, Vet to Vet Maine has begun an ambitious corporate sponsorship program to attract donors from the business community. Several business leaders have expressed interest in our program and indicated a willingness to support us as we strive for sustainability and growth.

CAROL RANCOURT, 1949-2021

Carol S. Rancourt, Volunteer Services manager at Southern Maine Agency on Aging and inspiration behind V2VME, came up with the idea for a friendly visitor program for older vets in Southern Maine, created the VISTA position to make it happen, and supported it every step of the way. Without her, Vet to Vet Maine would not exist. When V2VME transitioned from a SMAA program to an independent nonprofit, Carol became a member of V2VME's first board, serving as secretary. In 2019 the board voted to honor her as a director emeritus.





EDWARD ZINK JR, 1935-2021

Vet to Vet Maine Peer **Companion Edward Zink** Jr., 85, served 38 years in the Air Force. Ed was a member of the first Vet to Vet team of peer companions, signing up for service when the program was in its infancy at Southern Maine Agency on Aging. He visited his veteran friend, Mark, for the past 7 years. The two veterans and their wives went out to eat together before the COVID pandemic and spent many hours together. Ed was a member of the Amvets Post 2 in Yarmouth and spent many years volunteering in SMAA's Money Minders program.

CHARLES "CHUCK" THURBER, 1949–2021 Longtime V2VME peer companion Charles "Chuck" Thurber joined V2VME in May 2016 and was matched with four veterans. He and Patrick Masters, Chuck's latest veteran friend, were featured on a blog written by Diane Atwood in January 2020. In the article, Pat said Chuck was "someone who understands. Without saying anything, we understand one another. The camaraderie is great." In addition to his V2VME service, Chuck volunteered with Beacon Hospice, Samaritan's Purse, and his church in Buxton.

A Fond Farewell and Gratitude for Making a Difference

Andrea Tolbert, longtime Vet to Vet volunteer visitor and leader in the Vet to Vet Maine organization, resigned from the V2VME board of directors in April. Andrea first signed on to Vet to Vet in May 2017 as a peer companion, visiting Marcia Farr until Marcia's death in 2020. Andrea was a member of the first V2VME board of directors, formed in 2018. She helped guide development of V2VME's social media presence and more recently facilitated virtual training via Zoom and the production of a virtual training course that will allow V2VME to expand its reach to volunteers in other regions. A veteran herself, Andrea honorably served in the US Army for 4+ years, including deployment to Afghanistan and Iraq. Thank you, Andrea, for all your



During the case reviews, peer companions share stories about their meetings with their veteran friends, seek and give advice, make referrals, and enjoy each other's company.

Peer companion Eric Mihan, one of Vet to Vet's original volunteers in 2014, reported that he and his friend, Vernon Huestis, celebrated their 350th visit together recently. Other peer companions, Jerry Harkavy and David Backman, introduced their two Navy veterans, Leo Couture and Tom Daley, both of whom served in WWII in ships that at one time had been docked in Boston Harbor, side by side. The two Navy vets, who had never met, took to one another immediately, sharing a wealth of stories of that time when they were young sailors.

Bill Libby, a peer companion who also serves on the V2VME board, told of his delight in Zooming with his new friend, a 96-year-old Army veteran who served in Burma during WWII. The two are a good match, since Bill travels to Florida in the winter and his veteran prefers to Zoom rather than meeting in person. Many more stories every month!

other topics, including listening effectively and setting boundaries, coping with difficult situations, dealing with cognitive loss and dementia, and tips on working with other veterans. A panel of experienced V2VME peer companions tell the new volunteers about their experiences in the program, and a second panel provides information on where to go to obtain benefits and services for veterans.

From July 2020 to June 2021, 70 Vet to Vet ME Volunteers devoted more than 3,100 hours to 94 Veterans who needed a friend and 18 caregivers.






